Introduction

This unit introduces some of the UK's most significant monarchs:

King Henry VIII ruled from 1509 to 1547 and was part of the Tudor family. He is most famous for having had 6 wives.



Queen Elizabeth I was King Henry VIII daughter and reigned from 1558 to 1603. She was very loved by her people.

Queen Victoria was at her time the longest serving female monarch. She reigned from 1837 to 1901.





Queen Elizabeth II was the world's longest reigning female monarch and was queen from 1952 to 2022. She celebrated her platinum jubilee in 2022. Her son, Charles is now our king.



Buckingham Palace is the official palace of the royal family but not all of them have lived there. King Charles III lives in Clarence House in London.




Monarch: a person who rules a monarchy. Britain's monarchs are known as kings and queens.

Monarchy: a country where a monarch is the leader

Reign: the time when a monarch rules.

Government: A group of people who make rules and decisions for a country.

Succession: The person who takes over for the monarch is next in line of succession. This is mostly the monarchs first born child.
